Entrepreneur Ryan Nelson was about as strong a candidate as they come to be successful once he set out to bring a family concept for an organic and vegan energy bar to market.

Nelson, 26, of Ocean Township, thrives on the hard work that it has taken to get his Viva Energy Bar on the shelves of over 100 retailers in the tristate area since launching his business a year ago. He has since brought on two Associates who continue to work with him tirelessly as they bake, package, and deliver bars by the thousands.

Nelson was in Interfaith Neighbors Business Development Center's (BDC) first group of potential entrepreneurs in a program that is partnering with Rutgers University's Food Innovation Center to help teams or individuals create a product and bring it to market.

"I grew up in and around the organic retail industry and learned at an early age the values of entrepreneurship and the enjoyment that comes from building a company based around a fun culture," Nelson said.

His family owns Dean's Natural Market in Ocean Township, Shrewsbury, Basking Ridge and

Chester, and has been a supporter of youth development programs in Asbury Park and of other nonprofits.

Ryan's entrepreneurial spirit and work ethic have helped him

in launching his successful business. Instilling those values and skills is a big part of the Interfaith BDC program.

"A lesson that we try to teach is there's a lot more to getting a product to market than just having a great concept," said Gillian Edgar, Business Development Center Associate. "We give all of the teams the same guidance that we gave Ryan, and Ryan was able to capitalize on that because of his work ethic and what he could bring to the table."

Leading up to Interfaith Neighbors' 30th Anniversary Gala held in June, staff, Trustees, and friends were quietly asked to help seed this fund in Joe's honor. He was surprised with the establishment of the fund at the event. #### Neighbor Spotlight: Robert Beatty, III

One of the great matches at Kula Urban Farm last year was bringing on Asbury Park native Robert Beatty, III to help

Beatty, who is 30,

Beatty came on board with Interfaith Neighbors in March 2017 through Kula Farm's work experience program where residents can be paid for up 60 work hours at the farm. Fifteen residents completed the program so far and several, including Beatty, continued on to long-term, part-time jobs at the farm.

as he could, the younger Beatty says.

Beatty also has been able to help staff Kula's Farm to Table dinners at the greenhouse, a type of work that relates to his other job as a supervisor for a catering business at Monmouth Park Racetrack.

"He's been very consistent at work and has such a great personality," says Lisa Bagwell, who with Thijs van Oosterhout manages Interfaith's year-round Kula Urban Farm and oversees the Farm Without Borders program. "He's been good at bringing people into the farm. He's very welcoming."

Beatty says that when he first started helping to create the Farm Without Borders, located on land owned by Interfaith across from Kula Café, people in the neighborhood couldn't understand what he was doing working in a vacant lot.

"I felt we were helping the community," Beatty says. "This is an area that has known a lot of negativity and now that you have a garden smack in the middle of it, it's a positive."

"We help a lot of people with vegetables, and give them seeds to start their own gardens," Beatty

said. "All the food that's grown is free. We want people to stop by and get vegetables to cook and eat.

The farm has expanded from the original lot to

nearly three times in size, courtesy of Monmouth Elks Lodge No. 122 which owns the adjacent property.

"We get our water from the city fire department, which we really appreciate, and try to keep good relationships with everyone," Beatty said. "This was just a random dirt parking lot," he added in a rather proud way, standing in the midst of the flourishing summer garden. "We're open to all, and take what you need," he said.

### Mary Owen Borden Foundation

Our First Grant Supporter Has Never Stopped Giving

Thirty years ago, the Mary Owen Borden Foundation gave a newly-launched Interfaith Neighbors its first grant to help carry out a mission to prevent families from becoming homeless.

This year, as we celebrate 30 years of serving the community, we would like to remember that very first grant and express our appreciation of that foundation that has been with us all the way.

"Mary Owen Borden was the first, and has supported us consistently year in and year out," says Executive Director, Paul McEvily.

"Originally, the grants were for the homeless program, and then, beyond that, the Foundation has had a particular interest in supporting the revitalization of Asbury Park," McEvily said. "They've provided funding for our workforce development program, neighborhood revitalization, the Kula Café and Kula Urban Farm."

Because of Mary Owen Borden's interest in Asbury Park and revitalization, the foundation asked McEvily to join its Board of Trustees. "They were intent on having representation on their board from an agency that provides frontline services for the communities they support," he said.

Bertram H. Borden founded the Mary Owen Borden Foundation in 1934 to honor his wife shortly after her death. In the early decades, the foundation funded local charities and projects at Victory Park, Rumson High School, Monmouth Medical Center and the Manhattan School of Music.

In recent decades, Mary Owen Borden has focused on the needs of disadvantaged youth and their families in New Jersey's Mercer and Monmouth Counties. That focus on disadvantaged families led Mary Owen Borden to become a strong supporter of Interfaith.

Just as it did 30 years ago, the Foundation continues to support our program to prevent homelessness. The latest \$15,000 grant was awarded in June, 2018.
